

| 1888 | The first graduate of Wiley University (for so it was called at the time), Mr. H.B. Pemberton, was awarded the Bachelor of Arts degree. |

| 1918 | Thirkield Hall, a magnificent three-story structure was built and named for Bishop Wilbur P. Thirkield. |
| 1929 | Wiley College took the leadership role in reorganizing Black schools of higher education and renamed itself, Wiley College dropping the use of the term "University." |
| 1933 | Wiley was recognized in 1933 as an "A" class college by the Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools of the southern states. |
| 1935 | Won first debating championship. |
| 1944 | Joined the United Negro College Fund in 1944 as a charter member. |
| 1960 | Wiley College was admitted to full membership in the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools (SACS). |
| 2001 | Julius S. Scott Jr. Chapel erected. |
| 2007 | The College garnered rare, international visibility with the release of the movie, The Great Debaters. |
| 2011 | Haywood Strickland Living and Learning Center constructed. |
| 2012 | Received specialized accreditation of its business programs by the Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP). |
| 2018 | Lady Wildcats Volleyball team wins the NAIA RRAC Conference Championship. |



Figure 1 - 2021-2022 Revenues





Wiley College defines the freshman-to-sophomore retention rate as the first-time, full-time, bachelor degree cohort as defined by the IPEDS definition. Wiley College has compared itself to the below institutions as referenced in Table 12 (Peer Institutions with Retention and Graduation Rate).

The colleges or universities share like demographics in growth, size, religious association, age, race, gender, socioeconomic status, and/or liberal arts tradition. An aggregated average delimits an acceptable retention rate threshold as 60 percent. Wiley College retained 34% of its Fall 2020 cohort, which indicates Wiley College retention rate falls 26% below the threshold and 23% below its peer institutions, as referenced in Table 11 (SAM). Wiley College will continue the implementation of the College's strategic initiatives such as 'Wiley Cares' to improve its retention rate as reference in Figure 6 (Fall-to-Fall Retention).


Figure 5 – Fall-To-Fall Retention

Six-Year Graduation Rate


Figure 7 - Rising Junior Exam Average Scores

Wiley College's six-year graduation rate is 27 percent as reflected in Figure 7 (Six-Year Graduation Rate). This percentage captures graduates of the 2015 cohort as identified in the IPEDS Graduation Rates 2021-2022 statistical data file. The acceptable graduation rate threshold in comparison to Wiley's peer institutions is 30 percent as described in Table 12 (Peer Institutions with Retention and Graduation Rate). Wiley College graduate rate ranks 3% lower than the threshold and 9% below its peer institution comparisons.

Wiley College is an open enrollment institution committed to the principle of educational access. Holding true to its mission and moral compass, the College intentionally embraces students classified as 'at-risk and/or who are socioeconomically disadvantaged.

The Six-year graduation rate for the 2015 cohort is 27% which is 3% under the acceptable threshold.

Thirty-seven of the forty-one students who earned degrees from Wiley College from the 2015 cohort were African Americans.

Texas Examinations of Educator Standards (TExES) Passing Rate

The Texas Examination of Educator Standards (TExES) is a suite of computer-administered teacher certification examinations developed by the State Board for Education Certification (SBEC), the Texas Education Agency (TEA), and Educational Testing Service (ETS). According to Table 14 from 2017-2018 to 2018-2019, 2020-2021, and 2021-2022 all Wiley College students who took the TExES exam exceeded the minimum 80% state requirement pass rate, which is the teacher accreditation standard.



Education Testing Services (ETS) Proficiency Assessment Score

The purpose of the test is to assist Wiley College in collecting data which supports decisions to improve the general education curriculum. During the Fall 2021-2-22 academic year ninety-two students were administered the ETS Proficiency Profile Exam as show in Figure 9 (Rising Junior Examinees). The average score (MS) was 422. Two students reached the acceptable (MS) threshold of 430, while 14 students scored above the national norm of 438.

ETS Major Field Tests (MFT)

The ETS®Major Field Tests are comprehensive undergraduate outcomes assessments designed to measure the critical knowledge and understanding obtained by graduating seniors in a major field of study. The Major Field Tests go beyond the measurement of factual knowledge by helping Wiley College evaluate its students' ability to analyze and solve problems, understand relationships, and interpret material from their major field of study.

The national average composite score (ACS) for the Major Field Tests is 150 in 2021-2022. Wiley College established 150 as the acceptable threshold which is equal to the national average. The national ACS is subject to change. Testing Services provided Major Field Tests data for 2021-2022 as reflected in Table 15 (ETS Major Field Tests). As expected, some students scored well-above the 150 threshold, but averaged across the five disciplines – biology, business, chemistry, criminal justice, and sociology, the College's average scale score is 132. This outcome is eighteen points lower than the national average and the institution's internal goal. After evaluating the data, Testing Services started working with the Division of Academic Affairs to execute strategies to strengthen its program areas.

Post-Baccalaureate Placement

Wiley College recognizes the need for students to be gainfully employed or enrolled in graduate school within one year of graduation as an important indicator of student achievement. Therefore, Wiley College employs several ways to measure student success after graduation. The Office of Institutional Research pulls National Student Clearinghouse data utilizing its Student Tracker tool. In addition, Academic Affairs uses a special-touch approach by upholding the College's 'Wiley Cares' mantra through personalized phone calls, text messages, surveys, and social media engagement to gather post-graduation information. The College uses these varies mediums to track post-graduation experiences and satisfaction.

Wiley College's post-graduation placement goal of graduate schools and employment for the 2021-2022 graduating class is 45%. Tabulated data from Table 16 (Post-Graduation Survey) is 54% for the 2021-2022 graduating class. Wiley College exceeds the acceptable threshold for student achievement of graduates who

completed the survey. The Office of Institutional Research in collaboration with the Office of Career Services administers the survey annually.

The Office of Career Services polled 114 graduates for AY 2021-22. Of the 114 polled, 101 students responded to the survey, which equates to an 89% response rate. According to Table 16 (Post-Graduation Survey for 2021-2022) twenty-eight (28%) percent of the students have acquired gainful employment in their respective fields of study and 16% are awaiting a response. Graduate Colleges accepted twenty-seven (27%) percent of Wiley College's graduates and 39% are awaiting a response. Sixty-seven (67%) percent of the respondents agreed that Wiley College successfully prepared them for their current positions.

Wiley College identifies, evaluates, and publishes goals, and outcomes for student achievement appropriate to its mission, the nature of the students it serves, and the kinds of programs offered. Wiley College uses IPEDS data and National Student Clearinghouse data as metrics to monitor completion of students served by the College. Further, Wiley College utilizes the Student Achievement Matrix to publish such measures, goals, and outcomes for public examinations.














